

## **PAPER GUIDELINES**

### **IOSC 2027 - GENERAL MANUSCRIPT GUIDELINES FOR AUTHORS**

Congratulations! Your abstract has been selected for a paper to be presented at the 2027 International Oil Spill Conference (IOSC) to be held in Savannah, Georgia from May 17-20, 2027.

The conference session in which your paper will be presented will be overseen by a session chair, the name of whom will be identified to you separately.

Because your manuscript will need to be formatted for online publication in the IOSC Proceedings, it is important that you follow the guidelines below. Keep in mind that this is an interdisciplinary conference, so prepare your manuscript for readers who, although experts in their own fields, may not be familiar with yours.

**ATTENDANCE:** At least one of the paper authors is required to register at the conference and to attend in person the session at which the associated paper presentation will be given. The date and time and other details of the session will be provided to you separately.

**SUBMISSION PROCESS:** You will be submitting your paper through the IOSC submission site at <https://app.sessionboard.com/portal-login/iosc-2027/a1908e35-3ca0-4c01-b9cd-9a68f6efbb83>)

You will log back in using the original email address and password used to submit the abstract. Draft papers are due no later than December 18, 2026, for review by your session chair. Final papers, incorporating any amendments agreed with your chair, are due no later than March 19, 2027.

Your draft presentation is due by April 9, 2027, for review by your session chair, with the final version due by April 30, 2027. Presentation guidelines will be provided to you separately.

**Please use the following guidelines to complete your paper.**

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**PAPER SIZE:** Use 8.5 × 11 inch or A4 (white paper).

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**WORD PROCESSING PROGRAM(S):** Prepare your manuscript using Microsoft Word or similar word processing application; otherwise, plain text is suggested. For illustrations, we recommend Microsoft PowerPoint, Microsoft Word, Microsoft Excel, or a similar program.

**LENGTH OF WRITTEN SUBMISSION:** Maximum of 20 pages, minimum of 10 pages double-spaced, including figures, tables, and references.

**FIGURES AND TABLES:** Authors have the choice of either including their tables/figures near the text where they are discussed or placing them all at the end of the manuscript in order, before the References/Bibliography section. Photos should have a minimum 300 dpi resolution.

**SPACING:** Double-space your manuscript.

**LANGUAGE:** Use English.

**FORMAT:** Use the following format as a guide for your manuscript. Required in manuscript: TITLE, AUTHOR(S), ABSTRACT, REFERENCES. Suggested format for the remaining manuscript. INTRODUCTION, METHODS, RESULTS/DISCUSSION, CONCLUSIONS.

**TITLE:** Include the full title, centered at the top of the first page. This should be in BOLD font.

**ABSTRACT:** List your assigned Abstract Number first. Then provide a final summary of the manuscript, including major results, conclusions, and how they were formulated. Abstracts should be no more than 400 words, 200-300 words is preferable.

**AUTHOR(S) NAME(S):** List authors below the title on the first page. Use full names of authors. List authors in order, with the principal author first. Include affiliation and full mailing address for each author.

**TEXT:** Leave a 1-inch (2.54-centimeters) margin on each side of the page. Indent the first line of each paragraph.

**HEADINGS:** Label section headings and sub-headings clearly and consistently (e.g., section headings should be flush against the left margin in all capital letters; sub-headings should be flush against the left margin in initial capital letters). Major headings should be in BOLD font. For example:

**"METHODS"**

"Study area Sample collection"

**FOOTER PAGINATION AND HEADER INFO:** Use your word processor's header and footer features to include the following at the top and bottom of each page of your manuscript:

TOP: Abstract number (left justified) 2027 INTERNATIONAL OIL SPILL CONFERENCE (centered)

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**ACRONYMS, ABBREVIATIONS, AND SYMBOLS:** Spell out acronyms, abbreviations, and symbols the first time they are used.

**CITATIONS:** Refer to items in the reference list by author(s) name(s) and publication year. Citations should be included in the body of the manuscript using parentheses; for example, (Jones and Smith, 1999b). Citations that do not have a full reference in the reference list will be deleted.

**FOOTNOTES:** Use footnotes only when necessary and cite with a number on the page they appear.

**EQUATIONS:** Show equations as desired in the manuscript, since they will be printed as submitted. All variables should be explained in a caption or in the text.

**REFERENCES AND BIBLIOGRAPHY:** List documents cited in the text under "References" and documents not cited in the text but offered for further reading under "Bibliography." Documents are listed in alphabetical order by the lead author's last name in both the references and bibliography. If the same author produced more than one document in a year, identify the document by the year followed by a, b, c, etc. in both the text citation and the reference list. Since references are not verified prior to publication, authors are responsible for ensuring completeness—author(s) name(s); year of publication; article/chapter title; journal/book title; journal volume and number/book edition, publisher, city, and state or country; publication number (if applicable), conference name (if applicable); page range of article/chapter.
