IOSC 2027 - GENERAL POSTER GUIDELINES FOR AUTHORS

Congratulations! Your abstract has been selected to be presented as a poster at the 2027 International Oil Spill Conference (IOSC) to be held in Savannah, Georgia from May 17-20, 2027.

The conference poster session in which your paper will be presented will be overseen by a poster session chair, the name of whom will be identified to you separately.

Posters provide an excellent forum for authors to present their work in an informal and interactive setting. Posters are ideal to showcase speculative, late-breaking results or to introduce interesting, innovative work or policy viewpoints. However, posters are not to be used as a venue to sell a particular product. Posters sessions are highly interactive: they allow authors and interested participants to connect to each other and to engage in discussions about the work presented. Posters provide authors with a unique opportunity to draw attention to their work during the conference.

Because your poster will need to be formatted for online publication in the Proceedings of the conference, it is important that you follow the guidelines below. Keep in mind that this is an interdisciplinary conference, so prepare your poster for readers who, although experts in their own fields, may not be familiar with yours.

SUBMISSION PROCESS: You will be submitting your poster through the IOSC submission site at <https://app.sessionboard.com/portal-login/iosc-2027/a1908e35-3ca0-4c01-b9cd-9a68f6efbb83>)

You will log back in using the original email address and password used to submit the abstract. Draft posters are due no later than December 18, 2026. Final posters are due no later than April 30, 2027, which shall address reviewer feedback. ATTENDANCE: At least one of the poster authors is required to register at the conference and to attend the scheduled interactive poster session to discuss the poster with attendees during the “Meet the Poster Authors” session of the Conference. Poster authors may also post an informal schedule along with their poster, listing additional times when they plan to be available for discussion during the conference outside the session. Sign-up sheets allow interested viewers to obtain further information. Posters are advertised in the Final Program, and the authors' abstracts and final posters will be published in the 2027 IOSC Proceedings.

POSTER CONTENT: All posters should include the following information:

- The purpose and the goals of the work.
- Any background and motivation information needed to understand the work, as well as any critical hypotheses and assumptions that underlie the work, if appropriate.
- A summary of the contribution and/or results, in sufficient detail for a viewer to understand the work and/or results; especially key details, results, and contributions, or the anticipated contributions if the work is at an early stage.
- Where to find additional information. This should include, but is not restricted to:
 - A web site where viewers can go to find additional information about the work;
 - How to contact the authors, including email addresses; and
 - Citations for any papers, books, or other materials that provide additional information.



ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE: The conference organizers take a permissive approach to the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in the research writing process, including drafting and editing, provided authors verify all factual statements, analyses, references, and originality. These tools should not be used as a substitute for human critical thinking, expertise and evaluation. AI tools may be applied only with human oversight and control.

Authors are responsible solely for ensuring that their use of AI does not infringe upon the intellectual property, copyright, trademark, confidentiality, privacy, or other proprietary rights of any third party.

Authors should exercise caution when using AI-generated content, as such content may incorporate or resemble protected materials without attribution or authorization. The use of AI does not diminish an author's responsibility to comply with applicable intellectual property laws, licensing requirements, and ethical standards.

Full transparency is required through an 'AI Statement' to refute or describe the tools used, major prompts or workflow where relevant, and human oversight. Authors will agree the statement considered to be most appropriate with their session chairs and are required to include this statement within their poster. The statement should appear legibly on the poster.

Authors are not required to disclose the use of AI tools or features within specialist disability-related assistive technology, provided these are used solely for accessibility purposes.

No AI Assistance: "The authors declare that no Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools or Large Language Models (LLMs) were utilized in the execution of the research, data analysis, or drafting of this poster, beyond those used solely to improve readability, grammar, and structural formatting. The author(s) thoroughly reviewed the output and take full responsibility for the final content."

AI Assistance used: "During the drafting of this poster the author(s) used [NAME OF TOOL / SERVICE] in order to assist in writing data analysis scripts/executing computational tasks/summarizing literature/brainstorming concepts/drafting initial sections of this abstract/creating conceptual diagrams (delete as appropriate). After using this tool/service, the author(s) reviewed and edited the output as needed and take(s) full responsibility for the final content."

LAYOUT: The IOSC does not endorse any commercial poster printer or supplier. However, we've listed below an academic website that offers guidance for constructing good conference posters and may provide free poster templates:

POSTER SIZE: Posters may not exceed 8 feet wide by 4 feet high.

FONT: Text must be legible by viewers during the poster session at the conference. In general, use 14-point font or larger.

WORD PROCESSING PROGRAM(S): Please submit your poster to SessionBoard as a PowerPoint or PDF file (in addition to arriving at the conference with the poster).

FIGURES AND TABLES: Figures and tables, and their captions must be legible to the poster viewer. In general please use 14-point font or larger.

LANGUAGE: Use English

FORMAT: Use the following format as a guide for your poster:

Required in poster: TITLE, AUTHORS, ABSTRACT, REFERENCES, AI STATEMENT.



Suggested but not mandatory in poster: INTRODUCTION, METHODS and/or AIMS, RESULTS/DISCUSSION, CONCLUSIONS. These titles should be in BOLD font.

TITLE: Include the full title, centered at the top of the poster.

AUTHORS: List of all authors and their affiliations placed just under the TITLE. Use full names of authors. List authors in order, with the principal author first. Include affiliation and full mailing address for each author.

AUTHOR(S) NAME(S): List authors below the title. Use full names of authors. List authors in order, with principal author first. Include affiliation and full mailing address for each author.

ABSTRACT: List your assigned Abstract Number first. Then provide a final summary of the presented work, including major results, conclusions, and how they were formulated.

HEADINGS: Label section headings and sub-headings clearly and consistently.

ACRONYMS, ABBREVIATIONS, AND SYMBOLS: Spell out acronyms, abbreviations, the first time they are used. Explain any uncommon symbols.

CITATIONS: Refer to items in the reference list by author(s) name(s) and publication year. Citations should be included in the body of the manuscript using parentheses; for example, (Jones and Smith, 1999b). Citations that do not have a full reference in the reference list will be deleted. Citations may be made by using footnotes.

EQUATIONS: All variables should be explained in a caption or in the text.

REFERENCES AND BIBLIOGRAPHY: List documents cited in the text under “References” and documents not cited in the text but offered for further reading under “Bibliography.” Documents are listed in alphabetical order by the lead author’s last name in both the references and bibliography. Since references are not verified prior to publication, authors are responsible for ensuring completeness—author(s) name(s); year of publication; article/chapter title; journal/book title; journal volume and number/book edition; publisher, city, and state or country; publication number (if applicable), conference name (if applicable); page range of article/chapter. If the source has a digital object identifier (DOI), please include it as well in the citation. All posters and papers published in the IOSC Proceedings are tagged with their own unique DOIs. When DOIs are included for other material cited in the Reference and Bibliography sections, authors help to interlink the IOSC Proceedings with other related material across cyberspace.
